Presidents Message

Thankyou to all our coaches, managers, ground managers, canteen managers, our wonderful mini-refs, the age coordinators, gear manager and the committee who have worked tirelessly for the last two months, to get the season up and running. Operationally, we are short of volunteers this year. We offer honorariums to those people at the ground, who assist the club and the players, who set up and take down fields, who are ever present when something is required. What is happening is that our volunteers are being 'burnt' by the amount of work, and then they quite rightly, don't wish to return. We need twice as many people, that we currently have, to run a club of this size. If we don't see people from the club, volunteering for the club, then we have no choice but to reduce teams, which we don't want, or move to a more work-like type arrangement where we employ people.

If this is the case, then we may need to raise our fees to pay for these employees. We are looking for a few hours of your time, just 2 or 3, once a year, to be a ground manager, or to help set up field. If you have a skill set, it may be web master, it may be book keeping, it may be electrician, or posters, or sign writing, then let us know that you'd like to help. If you play in a team, and your over 18, then you should be volunteering for where possible for something during the season, no matter how small, because 1000 small items, build to a great deal of help.

Sub-Committee for Council Relations

Strategically, I would like to form a sub-committee that would open communications with Canterbury-Bankstown council. As a large club, we struggle to work with council, as the operations consumes a great deal of effort, and therefore the role of this committee would be to meet with council, to work out what we need to have facilities upgraded, to determine how a 'club house' could fit into a five year plan, what numbers council see as appropriate, and generally follow up council when items appear to drift. Defibrillators (AED) at Ewen and Beaman Canteens

A reminder to all Senior teams that in the case of an emergency, HPWFC has two defibrillators, located at each of the canteens at Ewen Park and Beaman Park. CPR and the use of a defibrillator gives a person in cardiac arrest the best chance of survival. In case of emergency, we recommend seeking out the Ground Official in the first instance who can assist in contacting emergency services and opening the ground gates.

We would also like to increase awareness of the importance of health checks for all ages, and in particular for all adult players over 35 years of age.

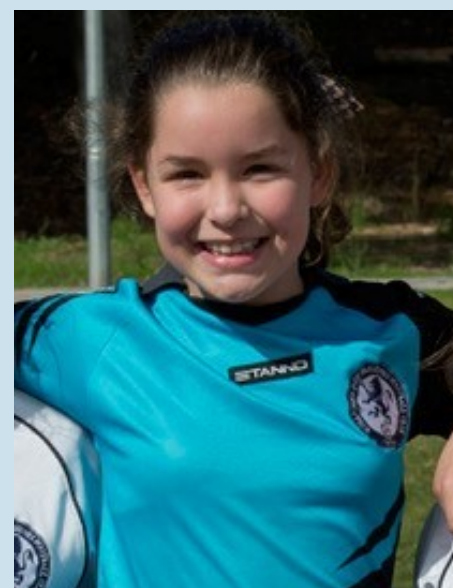

Charity in Focus—DT38

The DT38 Foundation has been set up in memory of Dylan Tombides. Dylan was an Australian International and West Ham United professional football player who passed away aged 20 in April 2014 after a 3 year battle with testicular cancer. The foundation has been formed as a result of Dylan initially being misdiagnosed. DT38's vision is to change the way testicular cancer is diagnosed by implementing best practice diagnostic guidelines for patients who present with testicular symptoms. They aim to arm future generations of young men with the necessary knowledge about testicular cancer that will enable them to be confident when taking health matters into their own hands.

They work with local area health services to place McGrath Breast Care Nurses in areas where they are needed most.

Leon answered our call for a coaching Coordinator and has taking immense strides in such a short period of time to put coaches in touch with coaches. We've set up a Google discussion group, and asked nearly 70 coaches to join. Leon has e-mailed all coaches and explained our mentor program, where a newbie coach, can request assist from a senior coach.

The [website](#) has been updated for Coaching resources, to include session plans, to include FFA manuals, and other items to help you plan you sessions. Leon has sent e-mails to all coaches to help you find your way. At HPW we want you to obtain a coaching certification, that will explain the FFA culture, that is the Hurlo culture, it's our curriculum, and over the next 3 years we want all coaches using this curriculum. If your under 8, it's all about discovery. From 9 – 12 , its skills, and then 13+, its game training and the 1-4-3-3 system.

If you haven't contacted Leon, please do so, so that we can build a culture of cooperation, of assistance, and one where players receive a better level of development, in an safe, friendly environment, that is full of fun and learning.

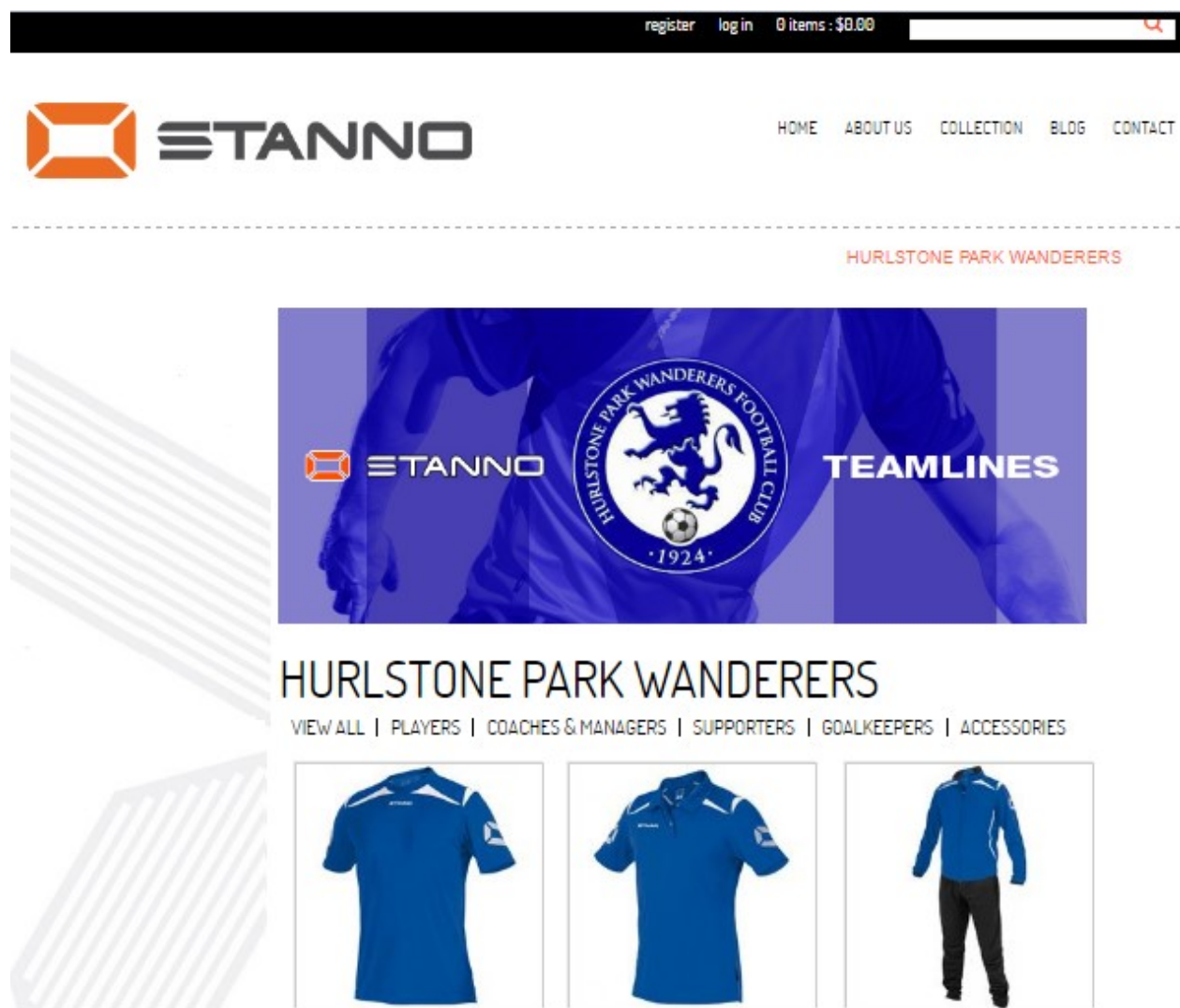

Match Day— Team Responsibilities

Hurlstone Park Wanderers are a community club, that promotes playing football in an inclusive manner, with respect for opponents, officials, and for the love of the game. We ask and expect that all teams provide volunteers to assist the Club with the following match day duties:

Field Set up - First Teams On

The first teams scheduled to play on the Ewen Park and Beaman Park fields must provide volunteers to set up the fields.

Tasks include:

- Set up the nets correctly
- Set up all corner posts
- Collect benches and place them in the technical zones
- Collect all chairs and place them in the referees area

Field Pack Up – Last Teams Off

The last teams scheduled to play on the Ewen Park and Beaman Park fields, must provide volunteers to pack up the fields.

Tasks include:

- Take down the nets and pack them away.
- Collect all corner posts and pack them away
- Collect all benches and pack them away
- Collect all chairs and pack them away
- Ground Managers will take down ropes.

Team official

Every team, on match day, must have one team official. This is in addition to the ground manager. So every team must have someone wearing the Orange Vest. The team official role is simply required to act as an impartial observer and to assist the Ground managers with any duties.

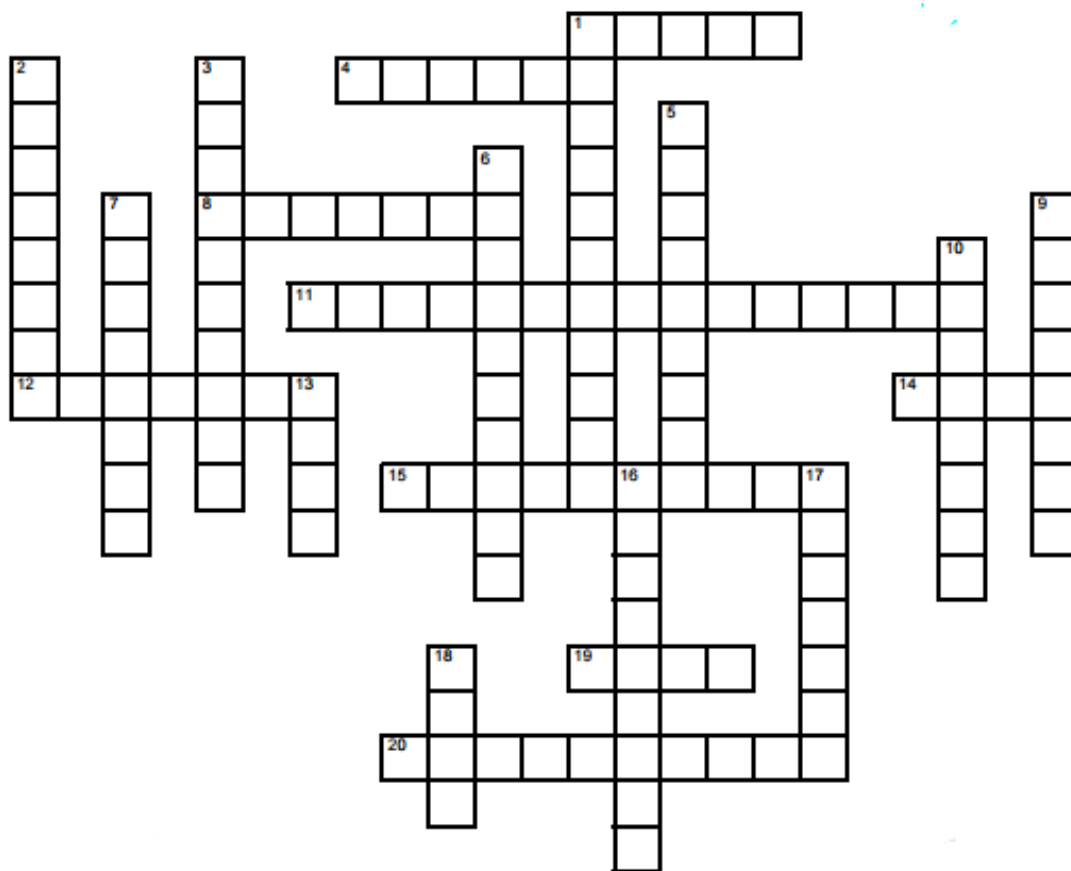
