A very big congratulations to all our teams throughout the season, but special mention needs to go to the u2ls, where we took out the championship in all three divisions (U21/1A, U21/2C and U21/3B, to our MIL1 team who were both minor premiers and premiers, to our BBC team who were minor premiers for the second season in a row, and then pushed through the disappointment of losing the grand final to go on to take out the Cottam Cup - the first time we have ever won this historic knockout competition, and to our u14/1s who went deep into the State Cup and also did really well in their Champions of Champions efforts. Our Grace Martin Trophy team also had a great season, qualifying for the grand final, with Stephanie Kontakis taking out the Golden Boot award. Also to our MIL1 and BBC teams for great performances in Champion of Champions - both teams were unlucky to come up against high ranking teams in early rounds, but put in stirling efforts on the field. We also congratulate all our other teams who reached semi finals, finals and grand finals and especially those who were division champions - you can read about each team here.

2024 will be a huge year for our club. On an unassuming plinth in Crinan Street there is a plaque that celebrates the establishment of our club in 1924, under the leadership of local football icon Bill Brackenbury. We are one of the oldest clubs in Australia, and our century of grassroots football has been part of enormous change in our game, at which Hurlstone Park Wanderers has often been at the forefront - for example in our emphasis on growth and participation for girls and women of all ages, in our championing of the move to small sided games for the youngest players and in our development of the miniref program





that was the forerunner to game leaders. We have also had a proud history of achievement in the club, with teams participating in external competitions such as Kanga Cup and Cottam Cup, with outstanding legends of the game who have been part of our club, such as Jim Fraser, Socceroos goalkeeper and still an amazing leader in the game. We are looking forward to celebrating this history throughout 2024, with an exciting program of events. We bring you a taste of what is to come in this newsletter.

The second reason that 2024 will be a huge year for us is obvious to anyone walking past Ewen Park over the past year. Through huge effort from club



members, dating back to fund-raising raffles when my children first joined the club more than 20 years ago, through countless meetings with Council, consultation with key stakeholders, development of designs and through grant applications (culminating in a Greater Cities Sports Grant of \$1 million in 2020) we are finally looking forward to our amazing new state of the art amenities building. It will be so exciting to be able to watch games at Ewen from the vantage point of the stepped seating or from the covered

breezeway, and even more exciting to have decent storage, up to date change rooms and a club room for our activities.

We hope you enjoy reading this newsletter that celebrates the 2023 season and looks forward to next year, and very much hope to have all our players and their families and supporters join us in 2024.

SPOTLIGHT ON OUR PARAMATILDA CHAMPION TAMSIN COLLEY



This year we were absolutely delighted to welcome Paralympian Tamsin Colley to the ranks of our All Age Women's players.

Tamsin is a superb athlete, who in 2016 was the youngest athlete to ever represent Australia in track and field at the Paralympics – Tamsin competed in the Athletics events.

Tamsin has developed a passion for football and her dream at the beginning of 2024 was to become a ParaMatilda – and while her athleticism and determination were going to get her there, what she also needed was football game experience. When she approached HPW expressing the interest to train with our women's teams it was a logical step for her to join a team – and so within a week she had signed up and was on the field playing for our AAW6B team who welcomed her as a fantastic addition.

Our team had a great season, with Tamsin being a rock of defence, and they qualified for the semi-finals. But what was even more exciting was that Tamsin was selected for a ParaMatildas training camp during the year, then for a Football NSW mixed team in the national championships. This was well on the way to the dream, so we were absolutely thrilled when Tamsin was named in the national squad for the 2023 IFCPF Asia-Oceania Championships in November. What an achievement.

Even more exciting, Tamsin made her debut as a ParaMatilda, featuring in the game against Nepal, and scoring a hattrick. This was a wonderful competition for the ParaMatildas who finished as the Champions of the competition. We couldn't be prouder of her achievements, but also thrilled that Tamsin has continued loving playing football with HPW in the Football Canterbury competition – rounding out the year in the FC Summer Sixes competition. The FIFA Women's World Cup brought a focus on female participation in football throughout 2023, and brought football fans from all over the world to Australia.

One of the special highlights of this festival of football is the Beyond Greatness Community Football Tournament, that was hosted by FIFA on the forecourt of the Sydney Opera House on the Saturday before the Women's World Cup Final. We were especially honoured the HPW was invited to enter a team for this amazing tournament that featured FIFA Women's

World Cup legends including Fara Williams. Our team was one of just two grassroots teams competing, alongside (check who). Our u15/2 girls were thrilled to represent Hurlo, along with their coaches AAW6 players Gemma Viney and Isra Parr Plain. Over the day the girls played several games, with guest players from the FIFA legends. They had a ball, and were excited to be part of this amazing celebration of community football – they had their photos with Tim Cahill, they were presented with trophies and prizes and souvenirs. On the FIFA bus on the way back to Ewen Park the girls were buzzing with the thrill of the day.

BBC team wins the Cottam Cup







The Cottam Cup is a NSW Football institution. Run by Granville and Districts Soccer Football Association, it is the oldest continuously running knockout competition in Australia. It was originally established in 1907 as the Rawson Cup, but in 1917 it was re-named the Cottam Cup in honour of Private John Cottam, who was a renowned and talented player in the Granville Magpies team that had won the Cup three times, but was killed in action in World War 1. It has an amazing history, watch it here.

Granville opened the competition up to other districts, and it has been running as a fantastic inter-district competition for many years. But teams from the Granville competition have dominated.

Until this year, when our Bill Brackenbury Cup team mounted an exciting campaign that went right through the season, culminating in a hard fought final against an exciting and talented Brighton Heat team, full of players with Brazilian (read that as football genes and living and breathing football) who were already the Granville champions.

The road to the final was full of some fantastic games, that had to be wedged between the Football Canterbury competition, already a very packed schedule. Round 1 was early in the season – a trek for the team, out to Schofields Park to take on Riverstone Schofields FC, achieving a convincing win. Next up were three games providing a great spectacle for the Hurlo crowd, with night

games at Ewen against Oran Park Rovers and then Kellyville Kolts (a tight game, ending 3-2 our way), and then Norwest Football Club, putting us in the semi-finals. The semi-final was a local affair, with Football Canterbury rivals Enfield being the other non-Granville semi-finalist, and made more exciting because it was one of a series of three consecutive games vs Enfield leading into the end of the Football Canterbury season. A good win set us up for the final, but setting the date was a challenge, with the Women's World Cup and the Football Canterbury finals. In the end it was scheduled for after the end of our season - and so the boys trained on and played on.



And so on a chilly September Saturday night, the Hurlo loyal supporters made their way to Melita Stadium for this exciting final. To provide context, this was only the second time that a club from outside Granville had made



the final. The boys were determined to "bring Johnny home" and the locals were equally determined that they would not.

It was a great game, and our boys looked dominant with two goals and only 10 minutes to go before Brighton took one back. Even so, it looked like we had it in the bag until the last minute of stoppage time when somehow, out of nowhere Brighton scored an equaliser. Agonising after the grand final loss against Enfield still in the memory.



But the boys dug deep and went into the extra time with determination, and sure enough they scored a beautiful goal.

Celebrations all around (it perhaps should not be mentioned that the club President was leading these celebrations in the grandstand, having mis-read the rules as golden goal extra time!). So we were up, but holding on was still a challenge against an increasingly desperate and determined Brighton Heat. Full credit to the boys and the coaches, that they played their game and kept their cool to hold out for a magnificent win. It was a fitting end

to the Hurlo season to bring home some treasured new silverware, along with prize money and free entry to the competition in 2024.

Every player received an exact replica of John William Cottam's 1915 medal for winning the State Premiership with the Granville Magpies, the last football medal he received before

enlisting for WW1. The player of the match, our very own Brian McCarthy received a replica of the 1914 medallion, the first that John Cottam had received. And on behalf of the club, the BBC coaches Mark and Gus Brown attended the Granville District annual dinner and were presented with a replica of the Cottam Cup. We look forward to housing it in the new club room.




Introducing the Centenary Committee Chairperson


our Hurlo underage players during premier and Matilda matches, and overseeing the Hurlo recognition program, especially the coaches and club loyalty awards.

We extend our sincere thanks to Alanna for the countless hours she dedicated to the club, promoting the Football Canterbury league and nurturing the potential Matildas of the future.




























Travelling Hurlos
